


To foster a sense of familiarity and


recognition, key members of the administration, deans, and department heads were introduced, allowing students to establish clear connections with these influential figures.

The International School of Asia and the Pacific (ISAP) has been recognized as Rank 1 Top Performing school in the region after it inked an 83.67% passing rate, producing 41 new Licensed Customs Brokers (LCB) in the 2023 Customs Broker Licensure Examination held in various testing centers in Manila, Cebu, and Davao last November 8-9, 2023. ISAP stood on the brink of securing a first spot among the

ISAP stood on the brink of securing a first spot among the nation's top performing schools. Falling just one examinee short of clinching the second position.

The outstanding performance of the department was headed by CB Ronie E. Sugarol, dean of Customs Administration Department, and the instructors who provided the students with unmatched dedication in filling the gaps between the theory and reality of customs administration. According to the Professional Regulation Commission (PRC), 1,579

2,767 examinees (57.07%) out of nationwide aced the said examination. The results were released three (3) working days after examination. last day

Moreover, Orcales stated that she would gladly participate if AYIMUN was offered again in the future because it brings up a number of topics and their current and relevant national solutions.

Additionally, the conference made her realize that everyone has a different perspective on how to approach and deal with particular circumstances and that neither a major event nor an international setting should be able to stop her when she speaks up for what is right.

"Through AYIMUN, I was able to develop and hone my public speaking skills, meet people from diverse cultures through the many delegates, and even boost my confidence," added Ms. Orcales.



With pride and honor, the Medical Colleges of Northern Philippines -College of Nursing produced 138 Registered Nurses in the recently concluded 2023 Nursing Licensure Examination (NLE) last November

The new nurses were all first time takers from Batches 2022- Servi Dei with 84.78% and 2023- Posteri Cura with 100% who all



made a total passing rate of 95.17%.

They participated in an intensive in-house review program that began on September 21 at La Vista, Cabbo, Cagayan, lasting nearly two months. This school-organized review aimed to create a space where students could enhance their knowledge and skills through a series of practice tests, all within a calm and productive environment.

Meanwhile, the Philippine Regulation Commission announced that 25,761 out of 32,203 takers passed the said exam which inked an incredible 80% national passing rate, the highest rate to date.

Additionally, the exam was given by the Board of Nursing in all 19 testing centers all over the Philippines.

Three Red Cross Chapters Unite for a Successful Blood Drive

Three local Red Cross chapters joined forces to conduct a successful blood donation drive this Friday, October 13, at the Medical Colleges of Northern Philippines and the International School of Asia and the Pacific (MCNP-ISAP).

The event, which saw an overwhelming response from donors and volunteers, resulted in the collection of 158 lifesaving blood units.

The three Red Cross chapters, each known for their dedication to humanitarian efforts, included the Isabela, Kalinga, and Tuguegarao chapters. Together, they orchestrated a well-coordinated bloodletting drive that

left a lasting impact on both the local community and the institution.

Artificial intelligence is the ability of a computer or



A QUEST TO RETROSPECTION AND SOLUTION

chool has been considered a second home to every student around the world where they are taught to express their ideas and be the better version of themselves. It is where teachers and students engage in a respectful

argument where they hear each other out. But what happens if the school starts to do whatever they want and takes away the student's freedom of expression, completely disregarding their voice in decision and policy-making?

College students are supposed to be conscious and aware of their surroundings and should be very much involved in issues of the moment that can potentially risk their studies and their freedom to say what they want. But the culture of openness is suppressed in some


who are so conservative and hell-bent on keeping the image of their school clean and inviting, strive to stifle it with policies that seem so reasonable at first glance but are actually demurring if

School policies supposed to be protecting the students and encouraging them to go out of their comfort zone and not limiting them to grow and expand their creativity. It's true though that not all administrators are rotten and some actually wanted to build connection with their fuel: the students and some even just wanted to guide them towards the right path but sometimes, it's just hard to reach a common ground when beliefs and character clash.

In the University of Santo Tomas (UST), the school administration made a policy where student organizations are obliged to to fill up a document before posting on social media, which they call a media cencorship. Because of this, the National Union of Students of the Philippines (NUSP) condemned the move especially when press freedom is in peril due to the alarming growth of red tagging. That being said, how can a university that ought to be the paramount of awareness and empowerment try to downgrade the students' freedom of expression? When in fact they should be the one spearheading equality and freedom that ultimately shapes the school

Moreover, this vicious problem does not end with the restriction. From the get-go, students needed their freedom of speech because of the underlying problems that arise on their campus which typically involved enormous monetary contributions because of the lack of funds for each department and the academic clubs or the additional fees that weren't clearly specified when students first enrolled to a certain school, so whenever there are activities or any program that requires money, the organizers, who looked like a hungry salivating hyena always turn their head to the struggling students who doesn't even know what to balance anymore.

But according to the Republic Act 5546, an act that prohibits the collection of contributions in any form whatsoever, by any person for any project or purpose, whether voluntary or otherwise, from school children, students, and teachers of public and private schools, colleges and universities, it is provided in section 2 of the said act that if the violation is committed by a private education institution, the Secretary of Education, at his discretion, shall, in addition to penalty, suspend, revoke or otherwise cancel the authority operate of sucheducational to institution.

However, even with the basis of law, ignorance, and greed excuses no one and those who are in power will always turn a blind eye because what is a few bumps and bruises if they can still stand tall with money and power at their behest? Naturally, students will start to retaliate. But what can they do when no one is kind enough to listen?

Even Derek Bok, former president of Harvard University for 20 years observed that "Universities are like riverboat gamblers and exiled royalty: their desires are never satisfied." He hit the nail on the head with that statement since most students struggle not only with their studies but also with economic problems. Meanwhile, Benjamin Ginsberg's 2011 book, The Fall of the Faculty: The Rise of the All-Administrative University and Why It Matters, came as a thunderclap to the world of higher education. Ginsberg reported that overall university spending increased by 148 percent and administrative spending, though, increased by a whopping 235 percent (Muzaffar, Botirjon, Muxlisa, Yuldasheva, 2019, p.7).

With this we can infer that there is definitely an administrative sloth going on not only in the Philippines but around the world as well as the widening disparity of rich and poor kids in college that has been proven by a hard data coming from Jorge Klor de Alva and Mark Schneider of the Nexus Research and Policy Center in San Francisco, completely making it so alarming that the rub here is that college schools are becoming political and majority of Filipino lawmakers ignore the abuse and exploitation because those who run the schools are large and powerful that politician cannot even dare to touch them for they might lose potential supporters.

Furthermore, according to Article XIV.Sec.3 (1-2) of the 1987 Constitution, Higher Education Institution (HEI) shall teach the rights and duties of citizenship, strengthen ethical and spiritual values, develop moral character and personal discipline, encourage critical and creative thinking. Now, since academic freedom is vested in the HEI, it is their duty to protect and spread the judicious use of it for the benefit of

the society. They should promote fair and realistic way of studying without undermining the rights of student and disregarding their voice when it comes to policy or decision making meanwhile retaining the competitive edge of those HEIs.

Students should never be exploited or overburdened when it comes to their freedom of expression and financial capabilities because they serve as the future of this country. They should be given the right to protest without feeling antiacademic against the suffocating education system imposed by the nation-state legislators and school administrators who in fact should be acting as a pillar of success, hope, and dignity of every student in the Philippines. However, we all know that freedom in whatever form is never absolute. Students and admnistrators allike should learn how to compromise and build transparancy among them so that they will be able to maintain a harmonoius relationship.


sports development but recalibration has been put into motion since then.
